Normally, December is the time to review the old year. January is dedicated to making new plans, some more ambitious than others.

This January, I don't want to start by making plans. There is no need for it as far as Wardie Parish Church is concerned. We just completed our new

development plan! Our teams under the leadership of their conveners and with a little guidance of the steering group worked very hard on it from February to November 2018. Chris Boston kindly collated all the details and converted them into a plan that will inform our decisions and what we do for the coming three years. As a first introduction to some of the aims, Chris prepared a little challenge for you on p. 3.

This January, I simply want to start the New Year 2019 by saying thank you. On second thought, it's not that simple. Giving thanks is like eating good food or drinking a good glass of wine. To appreciate it, we need to take time to savour it. To allow the full flavour to come to the fore. There is much to be grateful for in the treasure box of our life which we fail to notice.

At a recent conference which looked at the value of human life, especially as we approach the end of our life, one of the speakers shared the following story with the audience. Every week, he said, he used to visit a friend who like himself was in his 80s. Until one day, he got up in the middle of the visit to declare to his friend: "Your constant complaining and moaning about everything under the sun is exhausting. My dear friend, I will not visit you ever again unless you promise me one thing. The first five minutes of every visit, you will tell me something that made you grateful. The rest of the time you can spend moaning." It was a small, but very effective change. The friend began to approach the visits noting down the good things that happened to him during the week. To his surprise, five minutes at the beginning were not enough.

Once we take time to write down all the things that give us reason to be thankful, we may discover to our surprise that the list is much longer than we expected it to be. We may also discover that the most precious things which make us truly grateful are not the most obvious ones, the ones we wrote on the top of the list, but those we wrote down on paper after some soul searching.



In Matthew's Gospel we are told that the wise men did not expect to find the joy of their hearts to lie on straw in a stable. They had to look hard for the reason that made them grateful forever. To them, it was worth all their riches, their gold, their frankincense and myrrh. Having been warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, they accepted a change of plans and returned to their country by another route.

I wonder how it would affect our lives if we started the New Year, not by making our plans first, but by taking time to search for all the good things God has sent our way, then write them down on a piece of paper. God knows, once we have discovered what gives us the greatest joy, we may find that it changes the route we take into the New Year.


