LENTEN BALANCE



An archer once went through the forest. His path led him near a famous monastery. It belonged to a religious order that was known for its strict rules. The archer was surprised to see monks lying in the grass of the monastery gardens. The monks seemed

to enjoy the sun, the air was filled with laughter. The archer was upset at what he saw. "How hypocritical", he said under his breath. "They say that discipline is of utmost importance in life and here they are, lazing around and wasting their time doing nothing." When a senior monk heard the archer, he went over to him, asking: "Tell me, if you were to shoot your bow, releasing one hundred arrows, one after the other, what would happen to your bow?" "My bow would break", the archer replied.

"If someone overstretches his powers, the will of that person will eventually break like a bow", the monk explained, "whoever does not find the balance between work and recreation, will lose their enthusiasm and will never reach far."

Lent is often associated with fasting, confessing one's sins and in general having a pretty miserable time. But there is another side to Lent, which is also described as the springtime of the church. Spring is a time full of energy when everything in nature comes alive. Lent, too, is meant to be a time of growth and of coming alive with new energy. Lent encourages us to go in search of the kind of energy that can make even the desert rejoice and blossom, as Isaiah tells it (35: 1), and produce new sources of refreshment.

One way of finding our balance is to retreat, to take a step back from our usual activities. Are we like an archer who risks breaking his bow or are we like the monks who have the courage to take time out and recalibrate?

This year, there are two retreat programmes on offer. You can join a day retreat organised by the Ecumenical Council of Churches for Trinity and Goldenacre. Or, If you are looking for something to keep you going every day, we invite you to join in a Lenten retreat from Ash Wednesday (6th March) to Easter (21st April) *(see adverts, right)*. You need no previous knowledge, only the willingness to set aside 15 minutes each day (or more if you have the time) and join a group of people who come together for a weekly meeting of an hour with others doing the retreat. If you are interested, please contact me or Lynn Mackenzie for more information. You can also take part in this retreat online without taking part in weekly meetings.

Whatever helps us to deepen our faith, whatever gives us new energy, is the kind of Lenten balance worth seeking. *Ute*

Edinburgh Street Pastors – feet on the streets



Last year I trained to be a Street Pastor. I have always loved the Letter from James – we even chose James to be the reading at our wedding! – and the call to put faith in to action and I felt the need to explore whether I had what it took to be one of the volunteer pastors who patrol the city streets in the wee small hours.

Edinburgh Street Pastors was set up in 2009. We are a group of Christians who are trained to respond to the issues which arise during the night time economy. Edinburgh is a very different place at night and Street Pastors can be found every Friday and alternate Saturday nights between the hours of 11pm and 4am responding to the needs of the homeless, to clubbers or pub goers who have taken drink or drugs, to those with mental health issues and to vulnerable youngsters, to tourists and visitors to our city. We do not judge; we listen, care and help. And we seek to extend the grace and compassion of Christ to those in need.

Becoming part of the Street Pastor community has been a privilege and I have found such joy in getting to know my fellow volunteers – we come from diverse backgrounds and many different denominations but are as one in believing that Christ's love is needed on the streets of our city.

It is important to Street Pastors to be supported in prayer. We pray a lot. We begin and end our shifts with prayer, we pray on the streets with people if they want us to and we welcome the prayers of our home churches to support our work. I would be very grateful if members of Wardie would keep Edinburgh Street Pastors and our work in Christ's name in their prayers.

And finally! We are always looking for more volunteers from our city's churches – if you think you may want to explore this opportunity to serve, please seek me out after a Sunday service and I will be happy to give you more information.

Prayer Corner


