

Climate Emergency Vigil

Handbell ringers from St Mary's Cathedral and (after the annual gathering) our EcoCongregation Scotland Chaplain joined a lovely Buddhist nun, and families and individuals (old and young) at a candlelit vigil for 'Earth Hour 2019' – Climate Emergency.

The event on 30th March was hosted outside the City Chambers by 'Extinction Rebellion' and, unlike many of their noisier events, this was simply was a time of silent and brief reflections (and private prayer).

The vigil was for our politicians (City Council and Holyrood at the very least) to set an example and to stop climate chaos (climate change), now a 'climate emergency', to make laws and investment for us to be 'carbon neutral' and to lead plans that get us all working together to reduce risks from greenhouse gases and pollution.

The big mock thermometer showed the rise of global temperatures since 1990 and how much they were predicted to rise again within a dozen years. Predicted outcomes include mass extinctions, including of people in low-lying cities and nations, previously fertile land no longer good for food crops, poisoned air and contaminated oceans.

Twelve bells tolled throughout the hour. We also heard short poems, readings or songs and, lastly, held hands.

By the time you read this article, we may know if Scotland chooses to set the harder targets we need and also what the latest International Panel on Climate Change expects the forecast for climate chaos to be. As a Christian community we are called to put God's love into action, to work together to solve this climate emergency, to speak up and be active champions for God's beautiful created order, and to join in prayers for a fragile world.
