## **MATTERS ETERNAL**



When the earthquake shook Lisbon, around 9.40am on 1st November 1755, the shockwaves were felt throughout Europe and as far as Finland. The lives of up to 70,000 people in Portugal, Spain and Morocco were claimed by the earthquake along with the fires and several tsunami waves that followed. 85% of buildings were destroyed and among them were

many churches. The earthquake tragically struck during Morning Mass on the Feast of All Saints, when churches were filled with people and candles burned brightly. In ruins, too, lay the newly built opera house, the royal library, the Ribeira Palace, and the Baixa – the Old Quarters. The earthquake challenged what people until then had believed to be certainties.

It had a profound effect on Europe's thinkers, philosophers and theologians alike. Voltaire, in his poem "On the Lisbon Disaster", questioned an overly optimistic view of the world the way it is: "Come, ye philosophers, who cry, 'All's well,' and contemplate this ruin of a world." The then prime minister of Portugal dealt with the catastrophe swiftly. When asked that same day what should now be done, he simply replied: "Bury the dead and heal the living."

A disaster of a different kind, entirely humanmade, struck Europe 80 years ago. In his poem "September 1, 1939", W.H. Auden reflected from America, where he lived at the time, on its beginning:

I sit in one of the dives On Fifty-second Street Uncertain and afraid As the clever hopes expire Of a low dishonest decade: Waves of anger and fear Circulate over the bright And darkened lands of the earth, Obsessing our private lives; The unmentionable odour of death Offends the September night.

There is nothing optimistic about his analysis of the situation. Sensing the enormity of the dark times that lay ahead, Auden concluded, "We must love one another or die". During this year's Remembrance Service, we will honour those who have died in the two World Wars by reflecting on the effects wars past and present have had on the lives of ordinary people, and how ordinary people, like you and me, have our part to play in cultivating peace.

1st November 2019 will be the day after the Halloween deadline that is Exit Day. "Deal or no deal. Do or die," according to the current prime minister (at the time of writing!). Yet far from creating certainties, the referendum decision has brought with it many questions about the future.

Times of great uncertainty can be destabilising. They make us wonder what we should believe in, what are the foundations and values we build our lives on. What and in whom can we trust with our future?

November can provide us with some answers to these questions, which have been asked by saints down the ages in challenging times. Focusing on matters eternal enabled them to show courage in times of crisis, to break with convention when necessary, and come up with radical answers. There is no shortage of saints in Scotland and abroad, ancient and contemporary, who are worth discovering for yourself. Starting on All Saints Day, on 1st November, and finishing with St Andrew's Day, on the 30th, why not go in search of answers provided by saintly people. One of them, St Teresa of Avila, wrote these words that seem appropriate for our times:

Let nothing disturb you, Let nothing frighten you; for the one who has God, nothing is lacking. Let nothing disturb you, Let nothing frighten you; God alone is enough.

May all the saints inspire and challenge you to go about your daily round focused on what is of lasting value - matters eternal, Ute
